It might be that the belt is damaged or worn, the belt could have stretched, one or more belt keepers could be bent out of place or there could be a damaged pulley or pulley bracket.Our Checklist to Diagnose Why a Deck Belt Repeatedly Comes Off?To get to the bottom of a deck belt that repeatedly comes off, youll need to set aside some time to take a closer look at all of the components that come into contact with the belt.There will be some sort of problem with at least one of them or with the belt itself. They dont just come off for no reason.Run through the checklist until you find out the cause. Good luck!Belt is Worn/Damaged?This is personally one that Ive heard of quite a lot. I have a few buddies that run landscaping services and when the deck belt starts to really wear, youll find it comes off more and more.Thats because the belt becomes thinner in these worn spots, which is how it slips off.Solution: Your only solution in this situation is going to be to replace the deck belt, as its not possible to repair these worn spots.Whatever you do, dont get a cheap aftermarket replacement though, as they often wear super quickly always go with an OEM belt.Ive also heard very good things about belts containing kevlar fibers, so that might be worth checking out.Belt Has Stretched?If you cant see any visible damage or worn spots on your belt, but you have been using the belt for a considerable amount of time, its possible it may have stretched.Do lawn mower belts stretch?? is most peoples response to this suggestion. But they can and do.And if this is the case it could explain why your mower deck belt keeps coming off, as its now too big. Even if just fractionally too big, the belt will work its way off.Solution: Like with the last issue, theres no way to reverse a stretched lawn mower belt, so your only option is going to be to source a replacement.Wrong Belt Installed?Did you replace the belt yourself the last time that it broke? If so, are you 100% sure that you bought the right belt?There are tons of different deck belts available and if you order online its very easy to make a mistake.If you ordered a belt that isnt the exact right belt for your lawn mower model, it could be too big, which is why it keeps coming off.Itll usually be obvious if this is the problem, as youll start having this problem right after changing the belt.Solution: If you bought the wrong belt, you need to get the right belt on order and fit it. Paying out for belts twice is annoying, but at least ill stop coming off.Belt Keeper is Bent?If you take a look at the deck, youll notice that alongside the pulleys you have some pins. These are belt keepers and are designed to keep the belt in place, on the pulley.If one or more of these should become bent, the belt will have a gap to go through.Its quite common that when theres a bent belt keeper, the deck belt comes off when lowering and raising the deck.Solution: Check each of the belt keepers to see whether they have been bent out of shape and adjust any that are not in the right place.Be careful not to push them too close to the pulleys though as this will prevent them from spinning freely.Pulleys that are Bent or Damaged?Each of the pulleys that the deck belt runs around should be level and spin freely. These pulleys do occasionally get damaged through use, and should they no longer run level, it can result in the belt slipping off the pulley during operation.To check this youre going to need to remove the belt completely, then check each pulley individually.Does it spin freely? Is it spinning level? If you find one that isnt, that could be the problem.Solution: You can try to bend them back into place with a bit of force (and maybe a hammer). Often its the bracket that bends.In the worst-case scenario, you may need to replace the pulley.Split Plate/Bracket Below Pulleys?When your mower deck belt keeps coming off, most of the focus gets put on the belt itself, the pulleys and the pulley keepers. These are the primary suspects and should be the things you check first.If you see nothing wrong with them, look closely at the pulley bracket and the plate it is attached to.Sometimes these things can split, and when the mower is in use, that extra give can cause the pulley to move and the belt to slip off.Solution: A split plate would need to be welded and a bracket either repaired or replaced to fix this issue.Plan of Action (Quick Summary)If your mower deck belt keeps coming off its a pain in the butt. Once you put it right, you can get back to what matters the most cutting your grass! Why Does My Riding Mower Belt Keep Coming Off?Owning a mower has always come in handy for many homeowners. But if you have ever had a deck belt come off, then you know how annoying that gets. Sometimes, you can go on and on but the belt staying on your mower deck becomes rarer. Before going into any action with it, check to ensure your belts are in good condition. You wouldnt want to damage other parts of your mower. Thats because mower deck belts and drive belts are necessary functions of your mower. So, if one of the belts comes off your mower, your mower will fail to move or cut grass. Keeping your belts and surrounding parts in good shape is essential. Features like the belt guides and brackets may get out of adjustment, or theres damage to the brackets, bearings, or bushings. Before you work on your mower deck belt, this article provides explanations for why your belt may come off your mower. Perhaps you performed a DIY the last time you bought a deck belt, and it broke. You may have purchased the wrong match for your mower. Since there are tons of different deck belts in the market, its easier to buy the wrong one or get the wrong order. If you ordered the wrong match for your lawn mower model, it will keep coming off, especially if its too big. That presents a problem when you mow your lawn at close intervals. However, its not an irredeemable issue. You can identify the proper deck belt for your mower and have the wrong one replaced. Paying for another belt is frustrating, but the suitable replacement will stop coming off. Deck belts get bent over time, and that makes them come off more frequently. One reason is that the belt becomes thinner in the worn spots, so it slips off. You can get rid of worn ones and replace them with new deck belts. If looking at options in the market, avoid cheap aftermarket deck belts, as they often wear quickly. More robust OEM models exist, so you can also check those out. Your mower comes with belt guides or belt keepers. They are small, rod-shaped posts designed to go around the pulleys. Also, some travel alongside the deck belts, depending on how long the belt must travel. Like the belts, the belt guides can move out of place or get bent, especially when that extra slack can cause the belt to hit the guide, bending the belt guide back toward the pulleys. When that happens, the deck belt jumps off the pulley and comes off your mower. In addition, belt guides were never designed to touch the belt. Instead, they remain very close to the belt at about 1/8 to 1/4 away from the pulley. You can adjust the brackets by hitting them with a small hammer or vice grip to move them back into place. You will know that the bearings must be corrected when not running flat or straight. In most cases, the failed bearing is located in an idler pulley. The idler pulley has a sealed bearing, which means you have to replace the whole pulley with a bad bearing. Not all pulled have a sealed bearing. However, you may come across drive pulleys or spindle housings with replaceable bearings. That means you can complete repairs with fewer parts. Further, you can spot bearing failures in spindle housings when you grab the blades and rock back and forth. If you feel movement, replace the bearings in the cutter housings. These faults can cause your mower deck belt to come off. An essential part of the mower often overlooked is the belt keeper. Look at the deck: you will spot pin-like features alongside the pulleys. These belt keepers keep the belt in place and on the pulley. If one or more of the keepers get bent, a gap where the deck belt can go through will form. When that happens, the deck belt will come off when raising and lowering the deck. Always check each belt keeper to see whether they are bent or out of shape, and adjust them accordingly. Also, make sure sure you dont push them too close to the pulleys, as this can affect how they spin. Ensure that the deck is free of debris. Its common to have dry grass and debris forming under the lawn mower or on the deck. That often makes the tension pulley lack proper movement. As a result, the tension pulley can no longer keep proper tension on the belt. Once the tensioner lacks mobility, then the belt will not stay tight. To avoid this scenario, keeping your lawn mower clean under the belt covers and beneath the mower body is important. The cleaner your mower is, it is easier to find failing parts before they eventually stop running. Keeping your mower clean and in good condition will extend its lifespan and limit the chances of your mower deck belt coming off. When oil leaks on your lawn mower, it may get to the deck belt. This can lead to the belt coming off. Your pulleys must remain clean of oil and rust so your belts are always in good shape. In addition, oil is a petroleum product that can swell the deck belt the longer it remains. When a belt is covered with oil, it will begin to slip on the pulleys, which means it will have difficulty grabbing and building heat. As for rust, that will make the lawn mower belt dry out and crack. When you spot cracks on your deck belt, its time to replace it as soon as you can. Sometimes your mower deck belt keeps coming off, and most attention goes to the belt, the pulleys, and the pulley keepers. While these are the primary suspects, reserve judgment until you perform a check first. You may have done an assessment and still see nothing wrong with them. Please take a closer look at the pulley bracket, the plate, and the other parts it is attached to. The plate or bracket can usually split when the mower operates. That extra push can cause the pulleys to move and the deck belt to slip off. Thankfully, you can weld a broken split plate. You can also repair a bracket, but some situations will demand you replace them. These are common issues associated with mower deck belts keeping coming off. Without checking out the parts for such faults, you will have difficulty moving your lawn to perfection. Moreover, keeping your mower clean and free from dirt and debris takes little.
