All of them, however, have excellent websites that have a lot to teach us about creating websites. Gary Vaynerchuk Gary Vaynerchuk is a serial entrepreneur, podcaster and CEO of the full-service digital agency VaynerMedia. It's bold and in the face, and its site reflects it. To get an idea of his style, take a look at Thomas' interview in the past on episode 8 of the College Info Geek Podcast (was this really almost 5 years ago????). A Here's what you can learn: Video in the foreground «There is no doubt that Gary is responsible, based on the video of him who speaks with all his company in his office. authoritative, inspirational style. If you have a fantastic video showing your successes, insert it on the front page of your site may be a great way to distinguish yourself (although make sure it is not a crappy phone video that mimics your credibility). Hank Green Hank Green is a kind of Internet celebrity, as well as co-founder of many projects. Thomas also collaborated with him to produce a primer on the study skills for the Crash Course series. Here's what you can learn from your website: Project showcase with personality « Hank has done a lot of different things, and the homepage of his website shows her with minimalism and a pinch of humor; John Green The other half of Vlogbrothers, John Green is known for his best seller novels, although he also collaborates with other artists.Hank on projects like Crash Course and VidCon. This is what you can remove from your site: Compact Project Showcase – In one paragraph, John gives you everything you need to know about his great achievements. Includes links to his books, and then follows with links to his most acclaimed online projects. There is also a link to learn more if you are so inclined. This type of summary is super useful to include on your website, although you are not (yet) as accomplished as John. Give a concise summary; do not overwhelm visitors with your life story right out of the bat. Teju Cole Teju Cole is one of my favorite contemporary authors, so I had to include her website, especially after seeing her clean design. Cole's website is an educational contrast to John Green's. Both are authors, but in very different areas; their site projects reflect it. Here's what you can learn from Cole's website: Showing a variety of work – Cole is best known for his novels, but is also a frequent photographer and collaborator of magazines such as The Atlantic. Its website shows this variety of work, using one of its photos on the homepage with links to the other things it is about to do. Ali Abdaal Ali Abdaal is a UK doctor who also makes videos and podcasts on productivity, academics and personal development. The All site has a clean and simple design that uses emoji in a style quite reminiscent of Notion. Here is one of the main takeaways from its website: Content-Rich: Ali makes it easy to find information about who it is and what it does, but its site is also full of content. He creates messages for each podcast episode, and regularly writes blog posts as well. He also published his book notes. This focus on content perfectly complements its personal brand, and leads to more potential entry points for its site. Josh Kaufman Josh Kaufman is an author who writes about business, productivity and skill acquisition (among other things). It is best known for The Personal MBA, a book that distills the principles of business in terms that anyone can understand. Here's what his website can teach you: Explaining how he can help you - With 3 books published under his belt, Josh could simply say "this is what I did". But he doesn't like it. He not only describes what he does, but also "what's inside for you". This demonstrates a commitment to serve visitors to its site, which builds confidence. Examples of professional websites Next, we have a roundup of some professional websites alone. Some of them are freelance online, while others have bricks and mortar enterprises. This may not be the type of site you need as a student, but you will not be in college forever (which means we are failing at our job). If you decide to work for yourself, these are the types of sites you would like to create. Her website has a lot to teach anyone looking to build a website to sell their services:Clear call to action Just as she lands on her site, Rebecca comes up with a compelling offer. He knows his target audience clearly and doesn't waste his time. If you want what he's offering, you'll probably subscribe. Al Kavaddo Al Kavaddo is best known for his in-person workshops and YouTube videos of gymnastics and gravity-defying gymnastics. Andrew Huang Andrew Huang is aProducer and youtuber. I've been following her YouTube channel longer (and more consistently) than anyone else (except for the YouTube channel Cig, of course). His videos are creative, funny and always impressive. Here's what your website is teach us:à unique photo à The site's slogan tells us that àAndrew is musicà, but the photo says much more. Andrew is also creative, elegant and unconventional. Most of us won't be able to get a photo like this (and it wouldn't be appropriate for most of us anyway). But it's a lesson on how you can use photos on your website to show your personality, whatever it may be. Tommy Edison Self-proclaimed "Blind Film Critic", Tommy Edison runs another of my favorite YouTube channels: The Tommy Edison Experience. On this channel, he answers questions about what it's like to be blind from birth, all with his blend of humor and wit. Here's what her website can teach you: Innovative Branding: Blind Film Critic has to be one of my favorite brand statements on the internet. Challenge expectations by taking two things that most people would never put in the same sentence to create a brand (and YouTube series) that is totally unique. Tom Scott Another of my favorite YouTube's, Tom Scott runs a channel where he explores amazing places, things you might not know, and more (his channel is a little hard to explain, but really fun to watch). Here's what you can learn from Tom's site: Self-deprecating humor à If used properly, a little self-deprecating can make your site more accessible. Tom does it perfectly, slipping into the phrase "They'll probably come back to haunt me in a few years" before connecting to his YouTube channel, social media, and contact email. Beware, though, as this kind of humor can come down as a lack of self-confidence if you do it wrong. Clarissa Rodriguez We like to showcase the work of other people who are helping students succeed in college, and Clarissa Rodriguez is one of those people. It offers an online course on study skills, as well as customized study consultations. You can learn more about its inspiring story of going from failing multiple classes to graduating college with honors in episode 68 of the College Info Geek Podcast. By looking at her site, you can also learn some important lessons about personal branding: Clever Site Name à Clarissa has chosen a great name (and logo) for her site. Instead of writing "She Rocks at College", she chose to stylize the name as Using the "@" symbol is a great way to differentiate her brand name when addressing her college student audience. Nasos Papadopoulos Nasos Papadopoulos is the founder of MetaLearn, a method and series of courses that teaches you how to learn things on your own. The site also has a superb brand: Inviting, relevant photo à Nasos chose a perfect photo for his info page. Not surprisingly, but others show the work of the authors, photographers and the leaders of thought, which shows that you don't have to be a designer to have a design of the compelling site. Å à€" ~ "On nÀ à, ~" is also a nice branding touch.charli Marie Charli Marie is a designer, speaker and self-proclaimed Å à€" ~ "A "Side Project Addict" which currently Works for Email Marketing ConvertKit software company. The site is a design masterpiece: good taste animation - when charging the site for the first time, the name of Charli is displayed with an animation Å à€" ~ "Å"Writing". Animation is difficult To do well in the site's design, but Charli turns off. If you have abilities to add this design flowers to your site without slowing it, then give it a shot. But do you use attention.Want to start your side project? Here's how.Jon Miron Jon Miron is a designer and a product engineer. I could have put it in the section e' eDesignà€, but I think it is an even better lesson in the copy of the effective site: concise and memorable à€" e" help to grow brands that help the world is a concise declaration of purpose that attacks you with you, distilling what you do in such a compact format is not an easy task, but it is a powerful tool for marketing alone. how would you describe what you do in once sentences? joel runyon joel runyon is a world traveller, an ultra marathon runner and business founder. thomas interviewed him again in episode 43 of the college podcast info geek podcast after learning about his impossible list concept (an improved version of the classic list of "classical list" which I also incorporated into my website) herehere s what you can learn from joel on writing the website copy of the site: Choose 3 things - sum up in a few words is a challenge, and you certainly do more than one thing, but if you have a huge list of bullets of 15 different projects or abilities, it can be overwhelming for visitors to the site. joel showcase site a tactic you can hate when writing a summary of what you do: choose 3 things. joel are the travels, the ultra marathon running and building companies. What's yours? taylor pearson taylor pearson is aa wiser and an entrepreneur. I discovered it for the first time through his book, the end of jobs, which offers a provocative presence on the future of work and the global economy. What is its homepage can teach you to write copy of the website: Convincing question - Taylor's main goal is to get people to subscribe to your email list. To attract visitors, start with the question: "How can you better invest your time and money in the face of uncertainty?" Since most people want to make better use of their time and money, this is an effective way to get the subscription.Tam Pham Tam Pham is many things, as its website shows. Here's my biggest take-away:The use of emoji Òmoji instantly gives your site a casual and fun tone. As with exclamation points, however, using too many emoji can dilute their impact. Tam strategically uses emoji to highlight aspects of her story without overwhelming the reader. If you're looking to bring a similar feeling to your website, try some well-placed emojis. (Here's how to add emoji to WordPress, the platform we recommend to start a blog.) Pat Flynn Pat Flynn is podcaster, YouTuber, blogger, author and entrepreneur. He is best known for founding Smart Passive Income, a site that teaches people how to start their own passive income online activities (while remaining ethical and useful). Here's what it can teach you about the copy of Pat's site:À compelling story Pat includes a short article on this page of his site that attracts readers and invites them to learn more. Particularly convincing is the statement "He overcame the hardships of his career at a young age and found his own path and true passion". If I didn't already know Pat's story, it would make me want to read more to find out what this professional adversity was and how it was exactly. Pat got over it.Blog ExamplesIf you want to start a blog, you should! No matter what field you want to pursue, writing regularly is a way to clarify your thoughts and show the potential employers you know how to communicate (an essential soft skill). Here are some examples of my favorite blogs:Scott Young Scott Young's blog covers all aspects of self-learning. Whether it's completing the MIT Computer Science curriculum in a year or spending a year without speaking English, Scott's experiments are an inspiration for anyone who wants to learn something outside the classroom. Here's what it can teach you about starting a blog:Document your experiments "You don't have to be an expert to start a blog. Scott was not a computer scientist when he started the MIT Challenge; in fact, the charm of the series was that he had no previous knowledge of the subject. You don't have to be ambitious enough to apply the same principle to your blog. You could document fitness challenges, writing experiments, or something where you can restart progress and push your current skills.James Clear James Clear is a speaker and the author of atomic habits (one of the best books written on how to develop good habits and change bad ones). Much of that book is built by writing, writing, and thinking he did on his own. Here's what his blog can teach you: Nat Eliason Nat Eliason has an excellent blog, as well as one of my favorite weekly email newsletters through the Internet. It was a great inspiration for me to give up a traditional job, as it shows me that you don't have to have a main topic for your blog. The main lesson aspiring bloggers can learn from his site is:Write about what you are interested in - Nat wrote about everything from referral to how to open a coffee. And he keeps writing about new things while his interests change. It is a stimulating personal blogging strategy, which I encourage you to adopt if you just want to start a blog to put down your thoughts without the goal of creating a business (which has a set of completely different considerations). Austin Kleon Austin Kleon is a self-described author who draws. I turn to his books Steal Like an Artist, show your work, and keep walking whenever I need inspiration, and I am also a passionate follower of his daily blog. Here's what you can teach aspiring bloggers: Show your work - Ok, so this is a rip-off of his book title, but the entire premise of the Kleon site is to show his ongoing work, sketches and rough ideas. I like to see him think through a problem in the course of weeks or months, of how his thought evolves on issues related to art and life. You can do the same, no matter what kind of work you do; use the blog as a place to show your progress. Cal Newport Cal Newport is an author, blogger and professor of computer science at Georgetown University. His book Deep Work is one of the most influential non-fiction books I read, and his latest book Digital Minimalism is an intensely relevant reading for our current time. Additionally, his college success books were influential when Thomas was starting this site and staying in our student reading list. It is an influence that Thomas interviewed twice: first on episode 35 of the College Info Geek Podcast and again on episode 100. Thomas and Martin also recorded an episode discussing the key ideas of Digital Minimalism. Here's what Cal can teach you about blogging: Write less; Say more - Many of Cal's posts are quite short, sometimes only a few hundred words. Yet they are constantly interesting and reflective. This shows that you do not need to write long blog posts to have a valuable blog: a short, information-senso post can be more valuable than a long, bloated one. Tania Rascia Tania Rascia is a software developer who writes some of the best programming tutorials I read. Here's what his blog can teach you to write online: Editorial integrity and transparency - Tania is very clear that the site does not have ads, affiliates, sponsored posts, or paywall. It simply asks readers to enjoy his work and consider his support on Ko-Fi, a site that helps creators get financial support from their audience. There is nothing wrong with wrongMake money from your blog, but you should let your readers know how you do it and if it affects what you write about.PortFolio Site ExamplesÀ I close this post, I want to highlight some of my favorite portfolio sites. The people in attendance are a diverse cluster of writers, designers, developers and filmmakers, but all have sites that do a great job of showing off their work to potential clients or employers. Kristin Wong Kristin Wong is a personal finance writer, journalist and author of the book Get Money. He has also been a mentor to me in my writing and freelance career; Thomas interviewed the back in episode 27 of the Geek Info College podcast. Here's what you can learn from her site: use media logos - Kristin has been featured in some pretty impressive places, including the New York Times.If you have some kind of press or media feature for something you à€" VE Written or otherwise made, using logos from the relevant media outlets (with permission, of course) can be an immediate boost Anna Ellenberger Anna Ellenberger is an artist who works under the name of the name. Seen a lot of fancy layouts in this post for the work on display, but there's nothing wrong with keeping it simple: Some designs are classic for a reason.Martin Boehme Martin Boehme is responsible for all code and development here at the Info Geek college. He also co-hosts the Geek Info Comune podcast and spends his spare time learning languages and taking photos. Here's what his website can teach! One-page design portfolio - in one concise page, Martin lists all his interests and accomplishments. There are links if you want to learn/see more about each of them, but on the main page keeps things simple, with every Written as a phrase for the easy fashion show. You can do the same when you want to show your work and your interests.ashley Deri ashley Deri Dies Manage all things graphic design and illustration here a Info Geek, in addition to running an Etsy store where he sells prints, stickers and postcards of his original illustrations. Here's what you can learn from her website: Images are compelling à In Ashley's case, the best way for her to showcase her work is to put the images directly on the home page. That would not be the right strategy for everyone. But even if the work you do is less visual, you can still use images as a way to attract people to see more of your projects. Daniel Grindrod Daniel Grindrod is a camera operator, videographer and director. His website shows it right away. Here's what her site can teach you to create a portfolio: Light Coil à The first thing her site visitors see is a built-in video showing her most recent work. Integrating the video into your site is always a good move, as long as it doesn't slow down your page.
