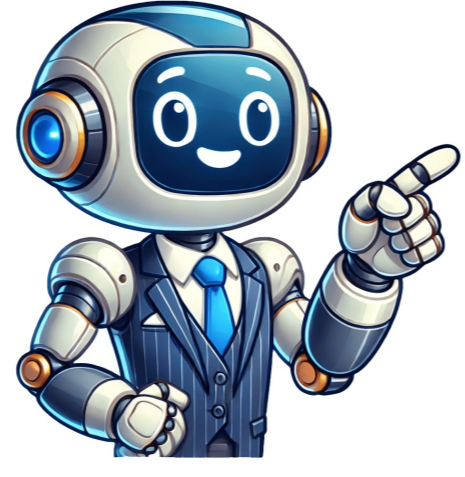

The game ends when all pairs of tiles have been removed from the board or when there are no more exposed pairs. Currently, you can find in the Zone several versions of the original online game, with different environments. = Try classic Mahjong This is Microsoft's basic version of a Tetris-like puzzle game. The aim of the game is to build blocks of the same color, which disappear once you arrange them in a horizontal line. The game can go on forever as long as you don't run out of room on the grid to place any of the blocks. Unlike the original physical Tetris, in the online version, the blocks don't fall from above, pressing the player to pick a position. They also can't be flipped, and the horizontal lines don't fall downwards as the blocks disappear. This game is all about fast thinking and decision-making. Since it can be played online, you can compete with your friends and acquaintances. It is worth a try if you haven't played it before. = Try 10x10 Classic Recently, Microsoft launched a new version of their jigsaw game to allow fans to play it far into the future, even after the classic Flash version is retired at the end of 2020. Microsoft launched 3 new puzzles every day to keep the fans entertained. Besides, the range of puzzle options is extensive, so for sure you can't be easily bored. Of course, one can choose their level of expertise, from easy (24pcs) to hard (100pcs). = Try Jigsaw Microsoft's Chess game is based on the classic chess game, only that it is played on a computer.
