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There is nothing more patriotic than a couple of veterans utilizing their God-given talent to sing an acapella number for America's Got Talent. And what better time to post about this than on #AmericanEagleDay. Leading the patriotic acapella group, "Voices of Service," is Caleb Green, a well-known anthem singer for the Capitals and recognized face to D.C. sports fans. They received a standing ovation after singing Katy Perry's "Rise" on the 14th season of NBC's America's Got Talent. Four Veterans compile the acapella group: Sergeant First Class Jason Hanna, active Sergeant Major Christal Rheams, Staff Sergeant Ron Henry and previously mentioned retired Master Sergeant Caleb Green. "Voices of Service" is affiliated with the Virginia-based Center for American Military Music Opportunities (CAMMO), a nonprofit dedicated to bringing military members together to share their love of music. When asked how they first met, Sergeant Ron Henry mentioned how they have a common bond to serve their country. "Being soldiers we cope with a lot of things," he reveals some of the heart-aching stories. "we averted an improvised explosive device, but the tank behind us hit it. It just tears you up inside, because it could have been your son, it could have been your daughter, it could have been a friend. And we still had to be resilient and do our job." "We would sit around and just start singing – that would help us get over what we went through earlier that day," he continued. "It would just bring a sense of hope. The bond of music got us through it all." Before they gave their bone-chilling performance, the "Voices of Service" mentioned how the power of music helped them with their post-traumatic stress disorders. "We are here to spread a message of love and hope for everyone in America who is coping with any challenge in life, to show what music can do." Says Sergeant Rheams and Henry. The first line of Katy Perry's "Rise" starts with "I won't just survive. Oh, you will see me thrive..." and as their harmonies hit the judges ears, they were immediately stunned by their talent. Judge, Gabrielle Union, quickly shot up with a standing ovation before the group got to the chorus. As their voices collaborated to bring a moving performance, the entire studio went into a standing ovation. After their performance, Gabrielle Union thanked them for saying, "The song, your voices, your ability, I can't thank you enough for all of it, thank you." Simon Cowell, one of the pioneer Judges of America's Got Talent, said "your story is amazing, your message is amazing...what I loved is the vocal arrangements are stunning. This is what we need right now. Thank you." After the three other judges simultaneous gave their "yesses" Simon Cowell said, "You haven't got three yesses," looking behind him at the audience, "you've got four thousand yesses." After their inspiring performance, Sergeant Rheams met with host Terry Crews talking about how important it is that they received the recognition. "I feel like there are so many people that get to hear this now, so many people that it will help," Rheams said. "I'm happy about that." Music has a way of moving people and helping cope with some mental hardships. The mission of the "Voices of Service" is to promote the message of the power of music. Hannah. When Voice of Service first performed Katy Perry's "Rise" on episode four of the audition rounds, they received a standing ovation from all four judges and the crowd. With Simon Cowell, Julianne Hough, Howie Mandell, and Gabrielle Union all giving Voices of Service a "Yes," the group moved onto the Judge's Cuts semi-finals, in which they once again wowed the panel, especially guest judge Jay Leno, and were unanimously voted to move onto the Finals. Green has been performing the National Anthem at the Verizon Center for years, and loves cheering on his favorite hockey team, who finally went on to win their first Stanley Cup Championship in 2018. When Caleb took part in the ALS Ice Bucket Challenge, he did it while wearing a Capitals jersey. Fun fact: Judge Julianne Hough's husband Brooks Laich used to play for the Washington Capitals before retiring from the NHL.2. Voices of Service Is a Product of CAMMOCAMMO is an acronym for the Center for American Military Music Opportunities, a foundation created in 2009 by Executive Director Cathie Lecheras and Army veteran Victor Hurtado. Realizing that musical artists with a history of serving their country were not receiving the development needed to succeed in the industry, or typically given the opportunity to train for careers in music production, recording, and management, as stated on their website, CAMMO was "envisioned [for] the creation of a military music community that would focus the world on America's most musically and technically talented service members." In addition to Voices of Service, CAMMO provides support and opportunities for numerous active and retired military members, kids programs, and provide music therapy services for members and their families suffering with PTSD. Voices of Service are Team Kodi LeeEven though they may be both competing for the \$1 million grand prize on Season 14 of America's Got Talent, Voices of Service, like much of the nation, has also fallen in love with singer Kodi Lee. The blind autistic performer won the Golden Buzzer on the series premiere, and will be performing on the same night as the acapella group to kick off the show's Live Rounds. Based on Voices of Service and Lee's continuously growing fan base, it wouldn't be surprising if they are two of the last acts competing during the show's series' finale.4. Each Singer is Based in the DC/Virginia Area with Their Families Caleb Green and his family Green said of his time in the military, "I have 8 combat deployments to Iraq and Afghanistan. One that comes to mind is we were on a ground convoy from one base to another and we averted an improvised explosive device. But the tank behind us hit it. It just tears you up inside because it could have been your son, your daughter, your friend. And we still had to be resilient and do our job." The former member of the U.S. Army Band lives in Woodbridge, Virginia with his wife and kids. Jason Hannah is still an active member in the military, and has earned a Bachelor of Science in Healthcare Sciences from Trident University International, and holds a Master of Science in Psychology from Walden University. He is a licensed practical nurse and an EMT. In addition to being a husband and father, he co-directs CAMMO's Kids Choir. Ron Henry, who's the Inspirational Director at CAMMO, and a former senior vocalist with the United States Army, said he joined Voices of Service because, "We want to spread a message of love and hope for everyone in America who is coping with any challenge in life to show what music can do." He's married to wife Tabitha, who also served in the U.S. Army. Their success on America's Got Talent helped promote national awareness of the struggle active members of the Armed Forces, veterans and their families often experience during as well as after their service. Green, Henry, Rheams and Hanna had all been working with CAMMO in different capacities when they were invited to perform the National Anthem with a choir as part of ceremonies held at the Women In Military Service for America Memorial at Arlington National Cemetery. They would be part of many more performances at events CAMMO participated in, and the chemistry between these four in particular sparked, then blossomed until it was undeniable and VOS. All four have been involved with CAMMO's many service programs which include hospital outreach programs: delivering Music as Therapy for servicemen and women who are coping with post-traumatic stress, and traumatic brain injury, (one of Henry's duties); CAMMO Kids (of which Rheams is Director); Life Support Coaching (one of Hanna's roles); providing CAMMO performers to participate in appropriate public events (Green is brand ambassador for events and partnerships); songwriting workshops; musical mentoring; and many more. A percentage of their performance fees are donated to support CAMMO's various programs. The Center for American Military Music Opportunities was founded in 2009 by Cathie Lecheras and Victor Hurtado. They wanted to offer career guidance and artist development to veterans and active service members interested in pursuing music industry careers in production, recording, management and other related music career as well as other services to the greater community of veterans, active service members and their families.
